2.1 The outcome of the Best Value Review of Learning Disability Services, and an Action Plan to address key areas, was reported to Cabinet by the Project Board on 2 May 2006. This is the first update concerning progress with the Action Plan.

2.2 The Project Board recommendations, and subsequently the Action Plan, focussed on the following areas of service: Person Centred Approaches, Supported Employment, Planning for future need, Direct Payments, Transport and Funding. Overall, the picture is one of steady progress toward desired outcomes. Please see the updated Action Plan in Appendix 1.

2.3 The development of a Learning Disability Commissioning Strategy over the next 6 months is an opportunity to build on current achievements and to set clear goals for the future development of services.

## 3. Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendation

3.1 All aspects of the Best Value Review Action Plan will continue to be taken forward by the Department in conjunction with the Learning Disability Partnership Board, and its sub groups. Regular reports on implementing will continue be made to the Adult Social Care Scrutiny Committee.
