Title of report: Joint Learning Disability Commissioning Strategy update

Purpose of report: To update Scrutiny with respect to the outcomes of the first Learning

Disability Joint Commissioning Strategy (2007-20100) and plans and

priorities for a new Strategy (2010 - 2013).

RECOMMENDATION

The Scrutiny Committee is recommended to consider information relating to the outcomes of "Strong Voices, Big Ideas" the Learning Disability Joint Commissioning Strategy 2007 - 2010 and the plans and priorities for the new Strategy 2010 – 2013.

1. Financial Appraisal

1.1 Any financial implications will be managed within existing resources.

2. Background and Supporting Information

- 2.1 The first Learning Disability Joint Commission Strategy, Strong Voices Big Ideas, was published in July 2007. Much has been achieved since, including:
 - A stronger Learning Disability Partnership Board
 - Significant improvements in the Involvement of people with learning disabilities
 - Significant increases in the numbers of people with learning disabilities using self directed support
 - Progress improving health services for people with learning disabilities
 - Higher numbers of people living in 'settled accommodation' Increases
 - Significant improvements in support available to help people with learning disabilities into employment
- 2.2 The development of a new 3 year strategy is now underway. The new Strategy (2010 -2013) will respond to the needs and views of local people with learning disabilities, their carers and the views of our wider stakeholders. It will also respond to the key policy steers, particularly those in Valuing People Now (2009) and Putting People First (2007). In doing so, the new strategy will not outline a radical new direction for commissioning and service development. The keys aims will remain to work closely with all our partners and other government agencies to develop high quality health and social care services that:
 - enable people to exercise more choice and control over their support and lives;
 - support people to live independently and safely in their own homes and communities;
 - effectively support carers;
 - provide support to those people in greatest and most urgent need; and
 - provide the best possible value for money.
- 2.3 Delivering these objectives within a difficult current and future financial climate will present a number of challenges. A clear Joint Commissioning Strategy will be critical in meeting them. In particular, the Increasing needs of the local population, particularly older people and young people with

complex needs, the increasing costs of services in the market and rising expectations of our stakeholders.

- 2.4 The new Joint Commissioning Plan will include a detailed Action Plan that will set out how we will work with our partners over the next 3 years to deliver our plans and priorities. It will describe the current and future needs of local people with learning disabilities and their carers and will clearly communicate our vision and priorities, making explicit can be delivered within specific timeframes and milestones.
- 2.5 Consultation and engagement with stakeholders is already underway. A copy of the key note presentation that is being used to support engagement with stakeholders during this process is attached at Appendix 1. A Commissioning Strategy document will be produced in July 2010. Publication of the draft Strategy will be followed by a further 3 month period of consultation.

3. Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendation

3.1 The implementation of the new Joint Learning Disability Commissioning Strategy will be taken forward by the Department and NHS colleagues, together with the Learning Disability Partnership Board, and community partners. Regular reports on implementation will continue to be made to the Adult Social Care Scrutiny Committee.
