1. Financial Appraisal

1.1 As part of the Reconciling Policy and Resources process for 2010/2011 Adult Social Care delivered £35,700 of savings by reducing the cost of engagement activity (see March 2011 Scrutiny update).

2. Background and Supporting Information

- 2.1 Adult Social Care use a range of engagement approaches to ensure we continue to engage with staff, service users and carers, organisations and residents. Outcomes from our consultations and engagements are fed back to stakeholders through quarterly consultation updates (see Appendix 1).
- 2.2 We are currently reviewing the Engagement and Involvement Strategy to ensure our engagement activity is cost-effective and inclusive. This includes looking at the engagement groups we run and their terms of reference and updating the joint Reward & Recognition Policy with the NHS. The updated strategy will be published before the end of 2011.
- 2.3 In order that we can be accountable to our local communities, we are asking people what information they would like to be provided in an annual Local Account. We are also asking how they would like this information to be presented. Views have been sought from engagement groups across East Sussex, including the Local Involvement Network and will continue to be gathered through to November 2011.
- 2.4 For the first part of this year, a range of events-related engagement activity have been undertaken, these include:
 - Feedback report from the 50+ Focus events published, (Jointly organised with the East Sussex Seniors' Association) A report summarising the main issues and ideas covered at the four engagement events for older people was published in May. All of the 350 people who attended received a copy of the report. What people told us at the event will inform the development of the next action plan relating to the 'Time of Our Lives' strategy, which aims to improve quality of life for people over fifty.
 - Provided feedback following the Closer to Home events, (Organised jointly with the PCTs). Following the two events in March, we have taken questions that couldn't be answered on the day and produced a Q&A which has been shared with all attendees.
 25 questions were answered, covering topics such as Tele-health, how mental health and Adult Social Care work together, eligibility criteria and much more.

- **Held two staff engagement events.** Two events held at the end of March updated staff on the budget position, integration with health, the Lean project and the changing nature of performance and monitoring arrangements for Adult Social Care. A Question and Answer response was prepared to address questions from the events that couldn't be answered on the day. This was emailed to all staff and is available on the intranet. Four further staff engagement events are planned for 4th, 7th, 10th and 14th October. The focus of these events will be Project Pathway, which is looking at the roles, responsibilities and skills of the staff who deliver the self-directed support pathway.
- 2.5 We have built on the successful models of engagement groups to develop:
 - A Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trans (LGBT) Health and Social Care Group, this
 group have commented on the development of the Adult Social Care local account;
 - A Mental Health, Spirituality and Faith forum, who have discussed ways to link in with local faith groups and exchanged ideas in how to achieve change and influence policy in mental health services;
 - A Personalisation User and Carer Advisory Group (PAG) to support the
 development of personalisation, they advise the Personalisation Development team and
 other Adult Social Care managers in areas including all aspects of developing selfdirected support, developing the social care market as well as performance standards.

2.6 In addition:

- We have established an Employee Representation Group
 - 15 representatives from across Adult Social Care have been bought together to make up the membership of our Employee Representation Group. The group will tackle issues raised in the 2009 staff survey and new issues raised by staff. Two meetings have been held so far and the group has developed an action plan. Work already undertaken includes improvements to the way information is communicated on the intranet and improvements to the induction process for managers.
- Reviewed the Disabled People's Participation Group (DPPG) focus to better align
 itself to Health Watch (ready for when the service starts). This includes looking at how
 the Steering Group communicates with and engages all members of the group. One of
 the aims of the group this year is to increase membership and to get more members
 actively involved in consultation, focus groups and as representatives on health and
 social care committees and boards.
- Expanded the Inclusion Advisory Group (IAG) (a forum of 'critical friends' who work
 in partnership to critique Equality Impact Assessments) to include members who will
 bring in knowledge of migrant communities; Gypsy and Traveller communities; lesbian,
 gay and bi-sexual perspectives on service use; and (BME) mental health issues.
 Meetings will also be happening more frequently this year to meet demand, with eight
 meetings planned from August onwards.
- Involved users and carers in scoring Commissioning Prospectus' applications
 In December last year we gathered together service users and carers to discuss what
 they wanted to see in applications made through the Commissioning Prospectus. The
 group then developed a question to be included in the application forms and a list of
 scoring criteria for marking applications against. In May most of the group again
 contributed their time to the project. This time they put the scoring criteria into action and
 scored their question as part of grant applications made through the Prospectus.

3. Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendations

The Scrutiny Committee is asked to consider the content of this report, there are no specific recommendations arising from this update.

Consultation updates & results

Managing the community care budget

This consultation covered proposals to change the Eligibility Criteria that we use to decide who receives Adult Social Care support and to the way we calculate Disability Related Expenditure (DRE).

After the consultation was launched on 5 January 2011 the department's financial situation became clearer. A decision was made at the County Council meeting on 8 February 2011 that adult social care in East Sussex should remain available to people with substantial and critical needs. This meant that the proposal to only fund people with critical needs would not need to go ahead.

A consultation report has been prepared on the DRE proposals. This will support a briefing paper that was due to be considered by the Lead Member for Adult Social Care in March. These papers will be available on our website shortly and we will provide an update in the next newsletter on the final decision and what people told us during the consultation.

Improving support for people with learning disabilities

The 'Living longer, living well' strategy

The commissioning strategy that sets out local plans to improve health, social care and housing support services for adults in later life and their carers over the next five years has been approved. The document is called 'Living longer, living well'.

Between June and August 2010 adults in later life and their carers, staff, health partners and the voluntary sector were asked for their views on the draft Joint Commissioning Strategy 2010-2015. Their views were gathered in a number of ways:

- A consultation event attended by 41 people (including staff).
- Council and NHS staff attendance at relevant meetings with feedback from 14 meetings or events and four written comments.
- A questionnaire available on the Council website which was completed by 19 people (76% agreed that the strategy would help adults in later life and their carers – the question was answered by 17 people).

Changes made to the strategy as a result of the consultation include writing an overarching paragraph in the strategy which reinforces the commitment to improved accessibility, use of sustainable transport and getting the most out of all our transport resources. Another suggestion was to include a separate statement on carers in the vision statement or actions. Since the carer's strategy already addresses these issues, we've strengthened the links between the two strategies.

Personalisation in East Sussex

The Putting People First programme formally closes on 31 March 2011, after a three year programme where we have introduced self-directed support (SDS) and personal budgets, and begun to increase personalised care and support options.

Developing personalisation in East Sussex is still a key priority, and a number of related projects are continuing during 2011/12 to ensure personalisation is fully embedded in the way we work and continues to meet national priorities. The projects will be organised into two areas of work:

- Choice, Market Development and Engagement (CMDE) focusing on increasing choice and developing the social care market with projects such as the Homeshare Scheme, micromarket development project and the Online Resource Directory.
- Self-Directed Support (SDS) and Lean implementation continuing to develop and implement the SDS pathway and tools during 2011 as well as providing ongoing support for practitioners.

In the last issue of this newsletter, we highlighted the different groups that have been consulted about the development of Putting People First and self-directed support. Older people share their views at four engagement events

The events were planned in partnership with East Sussex Seniors' Association (ESSA) seniors' forums across East Sussex, the NHS and other community organisations.

Time of our Lives is about improving and promoting quality of life for older people. Your views on proposed changes to day services

We'd like to hear your views on proposals for changes to the way day services are offered in the Bexhill, Lewes and Wealden areas.

Phoenix Centre, Lewes

We want to make better use of the Phoenix Centre and its facilities. The aim is to provide better value for money and improved results for service users and their carers.

Charter Centre, Bexhill

We are proposing to close the Charter Centre from January 2012. The centre is currently under used and we believe that it does not provide value for money. On average 47 people use the Charter Centre each week, (a usage rate of approximately 66%).

The day services currently provided at the centre would be provided by organisations in the independent and voluntary sectors instead.

Hookstead Centre, Crowborough

We are proposing to close the Hookstead Centre in Crowborough. The reasons for proposing to close the centre include the limited facilities it offers and our policy to move away from providing residential care ourselves when there are other providers capable of providing the same service.

The current residential respite services would instead be provided by the independent sector and day services would be relocated to the County Council's Bellbrook Centre in Uckfield.

We will be writing to current users of the service at the three centres, as well as their carers and close relatives, to invite them to take part in consultation meetings at the centre. Anyone with an interest in services for older people can take part in the consultation.

Consultation updates & results

Improving support for people with learning disabilities

We wanted to know what you thought about our 'big ideas' to improve support for people with learning disabilities, and their families. The

Council and the Primary Care Trusts in the county have joined together to write a plan for the next three years, from 2010 to 2013.

We received comments from service users, carers, providers of services and from colleagues who work for the County Council and Districts and Boroughs.

Overall the feedback was supportive of the general direction of travel set out in the plan. It was recognised that the plan was ambitious and some of the targets quite challenging. Suggestions to improve the plan included:

- improving support for people with learning disabilities and sensory impairments through better health checks and joint training for staff,
- including more information about the National Carers Strategy, focusing in particular on the distinctive role of family carers and their need for peer support, social networks and on-going support,
- links to the East Sussex County Council Transport plan in order to provide better information and access to transport services and take a partnership approach to training,
- including more information on the new Autism Act, and
- saying more clearly how access to hospital care and community health care will be improved.

We have updated the plan to reflect the comments we received and it has been presented to the Learning Disability Partnership Board. The final step of the approval process is getting strategy approved. Updated: Please note the strategy will now be considered by the Lead Member for Adult Social Care and the Primary Care Trusts in September, rather than July.

Managing the community care budget

We asked for your views on proposed changes to the community care budget. These were:

- changing our eligibility criteria from supporting "substantial" and "critical" to "critical" only, and
- changing the way we calculate the additional money people spend because they have a disability (we call this disability related expenditure). This is calculated as part of the financial assessment process.

During the consultation we received confirmation that the Council would receive an extra £6.9 million towards Adult Social Care for the next

financial year. With this additional money from the Department for Health, the Council is able to continue to offer support to people with substantial and critical needs. The decision was confirmed at the Council meeting on 8 February.

We received 4,547 questionnaires in response to the consultation. Of those, 40% of people agreed with the proposed changes to disability related expenditure, 24% neither agreed nor disagreed, 12% didn't know and 24% disagreed. Of the 40% of people who agreed with the proposal and added a comment, 22% felt the proposal would simplify the administration process.

We presented the disability related expenditure results to the Lead Member for Adult Social Care on 21 March 2011. The recommendation to introduce the bandings of £15 or £25 was agreed. People are still able to request an assessment if they prefer.

The majority of people (55%) disagreed with the proposed change to eligibility criteria, 29% agreed with the change (although some of the comments suggested people may have meant to disagree), 12% neither agreed or disagreed and 4% didn't know.

As part of the consultation an equality impact assessment was completed. We are now working to implement the recommendations identified by the assessment.

The information and views that were collected on eligibility criteria were shared with the department's management team.

Improving support for carers

In 2009 we consulted widely with carers, residents and organisations on our plans set out in the Joint Commissioning Strategy for Carers' Services 2010-2015.

The consultation was run in two stages and we received 920 completed questionnaires in stage one and 160 in stage two. So what have we achieved in the first year of the strategy (from April 2010 to April 2011)?

Engagement activity and events

What you told us at the 50+ Focus events for older people

In March 2011 we held four 50+ Focus events across the county. We have now produced a report which highlights what older people told us is important to them, and ideas and suggestions to improve quality of later life.

This year's events were planned in partnership with East Sussex Seniors Association (ESSA), the seniors' forums in East Sussex, the NHS, Districts and Boroughs and other organisations.

At each event the conversational café-style discussions focused on eight themes. The table below lists the eight themes and the top four categories that comments related to for each theme.
