1. Financial Appraisal

1.1. There were no specific financial implications arising from the review.

2. Background and Supporting Information

- 2.1 Appendix 1 is the action plan arising from the Scrutiny Review of Dementia caring for people with challenging needs. Immediately following the review, a report was received by Cabinet in July 2012 detailing the work underway in response to the review. This report provides a further update on the implementation of the action plan.
- 2.2 Good progress is being made against the body of recommendations.
- 2.3 Homecare providers have co-developed 'dementia champions' within their organisations. These staff meet on a regular basis supported by Adult Social Care.
- 2.4 Prompted by the Prime Minister's Dementia Challenge, four bids were submitted for funding to support development proposals in East Sussex. Results will be announced soon.
- 2.5 The Dementia Good Practice Guide produced by Adult Social Care has been well received and is being considered for 'roll out' across other service areas.

3. Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendation

3.1 The Scrutiny Committee is asked to consider the progress against the recommendations as outlined in appendix 1 and to request a further update in six months.

5	The evaluation of the impact of the Care Home In-Reach Service should be reported to the Scrutiny Committee for consideration.	The Care Home In-Reach Service will be evaluated in the latter part of 2012 and its findings will be reported to the Scrutiny Committee for its consideration.	The Care Home In-Reach (CHiR) Service is in the process of being evaluated. Initial findings demonstrate some qualitative benefits have been accrued to care homes worked with but its primary goal i.e. a reduction in hospital admissions from care homes worked with has not been evidenced / achieved. The service was initially funded through a DoH Regional Transformation Fund bid which once awarded and committed was then clawed back by the SHA leaving the CHiR Service as a significant cost pressure for 13/14 in East Sussex. Commissioners will be meeting with SPFT in the coming months to discuss the future of the service. The results of the evaluation when completed and the outcome of meetings with SPFT will be reported to the Scrutiny Committee.

7	Consideration should be given to the potential benefits and resource implications of applying for "dementia friendly community" status for East Sussex or specific local communities.	A pilot project to identify the best way for East Sussex to achieve 'dementia friendly community' status will be taken forward through the Sussex Dementia Partnership. This will also provide the opportunity to bid for external funding.	It was intended that a Sussex wide application to scope the implications of Dementia Friendly Communities across Sussex would be submitted to the Prime Ministers Dementia Challenge Fund. Unfortunately this approach was not supported by CCGs who are the lead bodies for application to the fund. There are undoubtedly benefits to be accrued to both people with dementia and their carers if communities are more aware of the needs of this group. However the levels of ongoing awareness raising and training (and the associated resource implications) required to impact on the behaviour and attitudes of service providers and the community at large is likely to be extensive. It may be that this aspiration could be usefully encompassed within the Community Safety Agenda and implemented through an incremental approach to the promotion of inclusive communities. A specialist OT has undertaken training in designing dementia friendly buildings and this has been offered to developments and partners as a resource.
8	The County Council should develop the proposed website dementia information 'hub' to support increased community awareness and availability of information to care providers.	The dementia information hub is being developed and will be implemented by December 2012.	The development of the dementia information hub using the ESCC website platform is underway. It will eventually be integrated with ESCC 1Space and will also provide information for staff which can be accessed through the ESCC intranet. It is hoped that it will go live in April 2013.
