Title of report:	Scrutiny Review of Dementia – caring for people with challenging needs: six month update (November 2012 – June 2013)
Purpose of report:	To inform Members of the progress made against the action plan resulting from the above Scrutiny Review.

# RECOMMENDATIONS

The Committee is recommended to:

- 1. Consider and comment on the progress made during the previous six months; and
- 2. Determine whether further reports are required.

### 1. Financial Appraisal

1.1. There were no specific financial implications arising from the review. Specific funding has been identified within the Action Plan below relating to set projects.

#### 2. Background and Supporting Information

2.1 Dementia services are commissioned directly by Adult Social Care and jointly with heath through Mental Health Joint Commissioners. Dementia services are reported through the Older Peoples Partnership Board, a multi-agency partnership of statutory agencies, voluntary and community sector, independent providers and representative organisations for older people in East Sussex. The strategic direction for these services is contained in the Older People and their Carers Joint Commissioning Strategy *Living longer, living well*.

2.2 Attached at Appendix 1 is the report providing an update on all of the recommendations from the action plan arising from the Scrutiny Review of Dementia – caring for people with challenging needs which concluded in June 2012. The Scrutiny Review report and departmental response were agreed by Council in July 2012 and an initial progress report provided to the Committee in November 2012.

2.3 Good progress is being made against the body of recommendations.

2.4 In addition, services have been commissioned through the Age Well Programme in St Leonard's. St Mathews Healthcare has purchased the Moreton Centre and is providing services for older people with dementia and behaviours that challenge.

2.5 11 of the existing 18 beds are currently occupied (as at 28 May 2013). Work is underway to develop additional bed capacity in two phases with an Autumn 2013 completion date.

2.6 Discussions are progressing regarding the possible provision of day services for the same client group.

# 3. Conclusion and Reasons for Recommendation

3.1 Progress continues with the recommendations as detailed in the Action Plan below. Additional developments in dementia services such as significant increases in diagnosis, development of memory assessment services (MAS) and a range of other work linked to the dementia pathway are underway and support this review.

3.2 The Scrutiny Committee is asked to consider the progress against the recommendations as outlined in Appendix 1 and to determine if further reports will be required.

Initial findings demonstrate some qualitative benefits have been accrued to care homes worked with but its primary goal i.e. a reduction in hospital admissions from care homes worked with has not been evidenced / achieved. The service was initially funded through a DoH Regional Transformation Fund bid which once awarded and committed was then clawed back by the SHA leaving the CHiR Service as a significant cost pressure for 13/14 in East Sussex. Commissioners will be meeting with SPFT in the coming months to discuss the future of the service. The results of the evaluation when completed and the outcome of meetings with SPFT will be reported to the Scrutiny Committee.	Care Home In-reach provision in East Sussex (of which the Dementia Team is one element) is currently under review by local Clinical Commissioning Groups. The review is being led by the Urgent Care Network (UCN) and the identification of a health lead to deliver the review underway. A six month extension of the Sussex Partnership Foundation Trust (SPFT) provided Dementia In-reach service has been agreed and future commissioning intentions will be reviewed in June 2013 subject to the progress of the UCN review. The opportunities for closer working with the Alzheimer's Society will be taken forward at the East Sussex Dementia Forum in July 2012. Work is on-going with the Alzheimer's Society and they continue to provide contracted services on behalf of the PCTs and Adult Social Care. It was intended that a Sussex wide application to scope the implications of Dementia Friendly Communities across Sussex would be submitted to the Prime Ministers Dementia Challenge Fund. Unfortunately this approach was not supported by CCG's who are the lead bodies for application to the fund. There are undoubtedly benefits to be accrued to both people with dementia and their carers if communities are more aware of the needs of this group. However the levels of on-going awareness raising and training (and the	As reported previously to the Scrutiny Committee, November 2012, the National Dementia Challenge Fund had been relatively limited in its scope, as much of its resources were targeted at improving early identification rates through the use of new technology. However in recognition of this, small amounts of resources have been made available to each CCG area in East Sussex to implement training to improve GP & Practice staff's understanding of dementia and facilitate minor environmental improvements, thus enabling Primary Care to participate in the Dementia Friendly Communities objectives.
