1. Financial implications

1.1 There are no financial implications directly associated with this report.

2. Notable achievements for this quarter for Children's Services

- 2.1 The following achievements have been noted during this quarter:
 - The percentage of 17 year olds participating in education and training rose 2.1% from last year to 79.65% (exceeding the target).
 - So far this year, 225 of parent/carer child interaction groups have been held (far exceeding the target of 80). The great success in this area is due to a decision to move the management of parent/carer child interaction groups directly to Children's Centres giving more parents and carers contact with the service. Parent/carer child interaction groups offer parents ideas and activities to use in helping their children learn and grow.

3. Performance against Key Service Targets in Children's Services

- 3.1 Of the 64 indicators due to be achieved this year:
 - 52 (81%) indicator targets were scored green;
 - 6 (11%) indicator targets scored amber; and
 - 5 (8%) indicator targets were scored red.
