Title of Report:	Looked After Children (LAC) Statistics

Purpose of Report:	To update the Panel on changes in the last quarter

Recommendations: The Corporate Parenting Panel is recommended to (1) note the contents of the report; and

(2) consider a report on the development of accommodation options for careleavers at the January 2013 meeting.

1. Financial Appraisal

1.1 Services for LAC are funded from the Children's Services base budget and supported with transformation money agreed within the Thrive budget.

2. Supporting information

2.1 The most recent LAC statistics are attached as Appendix 1.

2.2 Between July and the end of September 2012, the upward trend in the overall number of LAC appears to have been reversed with 23 fewer children overall at the end of the quarter.

2.3 At the end of the quarter, the total number of children in foster care has reduced to 493, with 6 fewer placements with in house foster carers and 4 fewer agency placements. There has also been a decrease of 11 children with kinship carers. There was 1 parent and baby placement.

2.4 The number of children placed with prospective adopters has fallen by 2. Activity rates are obviously closely allied to individual care planning for children.

2.5 The number of children subject to a Care Order placed at home with their parents has fallen by 3 to 17 at the end of the quarter. These placements are always monitored rigorously in order to mitigate any risk factors and agreement to the placement is given at a senior level.

2.6 The number of children subject to Residence Orders has risen by 9, with 23 additional children becoming subject to Special Guardianship Orders.

2.7 At the end of September there were 3 young people resident at The Bungalow and 2 at Acorns (one of these is a young man who is there for a short-term assessment).

2.8 At the end of the quarter no East Sussex children were subject to secure orders.

2.9 Numbers of young people placed in bed and breakfast accommodation have risen in the past quarter. This is the result of a number of young people having exhausted other options following difficult behaviour. It is also the case that some young people will choose this option despite advice; the task then becomes to wrap a support package around them. On occasion expensive agency placements have been ended when young people are not using them productively. It is important however to keep numbers and individual situations under review by senior staff to ensure that good plans are in place as far as possible. Further work is currently underway to increase accommodation options for careleavers

3. Conclusion and recommendation

3.1 LAC numbers are closely monitored by the management team and also within the overall Thrive programme. We may be beginning to see overall LAC numbers reducing. However in that this is offset by a significant rise in children subject to both Residence Orders and to Special Guardianship Orders, there will be ongoing financial expenditure in respect of that group of children, albeit at a lower level than if the children were to enter or remain in the care system. It is also the case that although this offers very positive permanent outcomes for some individual children it effectively takes some foster carers ' off the books' in terms of offering other placements.

3.2 Given that the use of bed and breakfast placements has risen it is recommended that the CPP receives and considers a report on the development of accommodation options for careleavers at the January 2013 meeting.
