<p>Highways contract re-procurement project – this ongoing scrutiny project has been in existence for two years and involves the whole scrutiny committee acting as a reference group (ie. meeting at key stages during the development of the new highways contract model providing valuable observations and recommendations along the way). It includes particular consideration of gully emptying.</p> <p>The committee has previously reviewed several highways contract models and has visited local authorities that have developed innovative approaches to their highways contract re-procurement in recent years.</p> <p>The committee/reference group will continue to meet, and provide comments and recommendations, until the re-procurement of the East Sussex highways contract is complete in 2015.</p> <p>Highways grass cutting and weed spraying: The Scrutiny Committee on 19 June 2013 appointed Councillors Claire Dowling, Michael Pursglove, Barry Taylor and John Hodges to explore the potential of this topic as a possible scrutiny review:</p> <p>Notes: Highways grass cutting and weed spraying: this issue affects all three tiers of local government in East Sussex and is a matter of considerable public and local interest.
