Title of Report:	Removal of community areas from the Home to School Transport policy.
By:	Director of Children's Services
Purpose of Report:	To seek agreement from the Lead Member that the removal of community areas from the Home To School Transport Policy (HTST) is not taken forward.

Recommendation:

The Lead Member is recommended to

1) note the information contained in this report and the comments received during the recent consultation exercise; and

2) agree that this proposal is not taken forward

1. Financial Appraisal

1.1 The report to Lead Member on 11 November 2013 stated there was no discernible financial impact from the proposal, as any savings would depend on parents' preferences for schools for the 2015/16 and subsequent school years. However, it was recommended this course of action would enable to County Council to exercise some control over the HTST budget should a school choose to change their community area which could increase HTST costs for the Local Authority. This issue has the potential to impact in particular on rural authorities and Oxfordshire and Hertfordshire have removed community areas from their transport policy for this reason.

1.2 However the decision made by the Lead Member on 20 January 2014 to implement the existing HTST for children living in shared community areas as written, so that transport would only be provided where the pupil attends the nearest school and meets the eligibility criteria means that the financial risk associated with schools changing their community areas is no longer relevant.

1.3 If at some point in the future, the decision was taken to reverse the decision made on 20th January 2014 to only provide transport for pupils living in shared community areas who attend their nearest school and meet the eligibility criteria, the case for removing community areas from the HTST policy would need to be re-examined.

2. Supporting Information

2.1 Although the consultation documentation stated the County Council was considering removing community areas from the transport policy for all statutory aged pupils, the Lead Member is advised that the proposal relates to secondary aged pupils only. There were no proposals to change the current transport policy for primary aged pupils.

2.2 The consultation on the removal of community areas took place between 24 February 2014 and 3 April 2014. A total of 198 comments were received online and others were received by email and letter. All have been included together with a summary of the online responses as Appendix 3. The County Council recognises this was likely to be an unpopular proposal, and the percentage of online respondents who disagreed or strongly disagreed with the proposal totalled 88.18%, with 11.11% who agreed or strongly agreed.

2.3 In addition a meeting was also held with a number of headteachers. Following that meeting it was agreed that further work should be undertaken to understand better the impact on schools and look at whether there were alternative options.

Positive themes:

- 'To most parents choice of school is more important rather than free transport to that school.'
- 'Schools nearest would mean children attending schools where their class fellows are also in their locality'
- '.....all choices have consequences and if the consequence of not sending your child to the nearest school is that you incur transport costs then you need to bear that in mind when making your decision.'
- 'I am hoping it may open up school opportunities previously closed due to oversubscription.'
- 'This is overdue. For too long now the taxpayer has been subsidising transport for those who have access to schools close by but have had the luxury of free travel to a school many miles from their home.'

Negative themes:

- 'Parents should have the right to choose which school they send their children to when presented with a choice of more than one school without having the added worry of financial implications for school transport.'
- 'Children need the right to be educated at the best school for them disregarding if it is the nearest.'
- 'The serious reduction of choice of school for students and parents appears to be in stark contrast to the government's aim to give greater choice to parents in relation to their children's education.'
- 'The new transport arrangements could lead to fewer families choosing Burwash Primary School means it will affect my children and all pupils at the school because of less money intake.'
- 'I believe this is an unsuitable change to make in a rural area where transport links are not good for children to get to school.'

3 Conclusion and Recommendations

3.1 The Lead Member is asked to note the contents of this report and specifically that the financial risk associated with schools changing their community areas is not currently relevant and therefore it is recommended that the removal of community areas from the HTST policy is not taken forward.

3.2 If at some point in the future, the Lead Member decided to reverse the decision made on 20th January 2014 to only provide transport for pupils living in shared community areas who attend their nearest school and meet the eligibility criteria, the case for removing community areas from the HTST policy would need to be re-examined.



Qualifying for home to school transport

The following circumstances explain when support can be given. If your situation does not fit the policy, then you will be responsible for making the transport arrangements.

Statutory walking distance

We will provide free transport between home and school for children over 8 years of age who live more than three miles (4828 metres) from the designated* school, or two miles (3218 metres) for children under 8 years of age. This is known as the **statutory walking distance**.

Distances are measured by the shortest available walking route using our Geographical Information System, taking account of, for example, passable public footpaths.

*The designated school is either the school suitable to the child's age, ability and aptitude which serves the area in which the child lives, or if there is more than one school, the nearest school to the home which is suitable for the child and at which a place is available.

Route safety

Where parents challenge the suitability of a route to school, the Director of Transport and Environment will assess the route and report on its safety using nationally set standards. The standards assume that the child is accompanied by a responsible adult. To qualify for help the child must be attending the **designated*** school. If alternative safe routes are available within the statutory walking distance then no help will be given.

Low income groups

Children from low income groups are defined as those who are entitled to free school meals (for criteria go to - eastsussex.gov.uk/educationandlearning/schools/meals/free) or those whose families are entitled to the maximum level of Working Tax Credit (WTC).

You can tell if you are in receipt of maximum WTC from your tax credit award notice issued by HM Revenue & Customs. Part 2 entitled 'How we work out your tax credits' includes details of WTC elements other than child care. It then lists 'any reduction due to your income'. You are in receipt of the maximum where the reduction shows nil (£0.00).

Primary age pupils – Children who qualify for assistance until age eight because their **designated*** school is more than two miles but less than three miles from their home, will continue to receive transport help if they are from a low income family.

Secondary age pupils – Children from low income families will qualify for free transport to one of their three nearest schools from where they live, provided the school attended is more than two miles but less than six miles. Distances up to two miles are determined by using the shortest available walking route whereas the six mile upper limit is measured using roads only.

Secondary age pupils attending church aided schools – Children from low income families attending the nearest church school preferred on grounds of religion or belief will qualify for free transport to that school if it is more than two miles but less than fifteen miles from home. Confirmation of baptismal status or support from the parish priest/minister is required.

Pupils unable to walk to school

Some children with SEN and/or a disability may not be able to walk even relatively short distances to school. Similarly, children with a mobility problem (including temporary medical conditions) may also be unable to walk to school.

To qualify for help, your child must be attending the **designated*** school. We will need to see medical evidence from a consultant or GP who must confirm the medical condition and that your child cannot walk the statutory distance. We will also need to know how long transport assistance is required and an indication of what mode of travel is appropriate. Where agreed, cases will be subject to review.

If you believe that your child needs help with the home to school journey due to their SEN or disability, you should call the Specialist Transport Officer on 0345 60 80 190 or email sen.transport@eastsussex.gov.uk for more advice.

Disabled parents/carers

If you are prevented from walking or accompanying your children on the home to school journey because of a disability, we may be able to assist with travel costs. This generally applies to parents of primary aged children as secondary aged pupils are expected to undertake the journey to school unaccompanied.

To receive help, your child/children must be attending the **designated*** school and in deciding whether to assist, account will be taken of the distance to school. Where the distance is very short, assistance may not be agreed, especially for a child in the upper juniors.

You will need to complete an application form and must attach medical evidence from a consultant or doctor (note – a fee may be charged for supplying relevant medical evidence and any costs would be met by the parent). We will not pay for this evidence. Transport will not be arranged until relevant evidence is provided. Cases agreed will be subject to regular reviews.

Transport assistance is not provided when parents are not available to accompany their child to school for other reasons.

Permanently excluded pupils returning to a school

Transport to a more distant school will be given if a child has been permanently excluded and can no longer attend their **designated*** school provided that they meet the distance or low income rules. Transport will be in place on the sixth day following the exclusion.

Attendance at College Central

Children attending College Central (formerly known as a Pupil Referral Unit) will be considered for assistance with transport in the same way as children attending **designated*** mainstream schools i.e. distance/low income reasons.

Travel provision given to 'eligible children'

Mode of travel

In most cases, we provide transport to get pupils between home and school at the beginning and end of the school day. This is done by supplying a ticket for use on public services or by allocating a seat on a hired vehicle.

Pick-up points

Pupils and students are collected as near to their home as possible although they may have to walk a 'reasonable' distance to meet the transport. This will usually not exceed one mile from the home address. The responsibility for ensuring a child's safety in getting to and from the picking up/setting down point rests with the parent/carer.

Journey time

There are no legal guidelines for what is a reasonable journey time. This will depend on the age and individual needs (e.g. SEN) of a child and the nature of the journey. However, we aim to ensure that no child will have a journey of no more than 75 minutes with the exception of school placements outside of the county, which will inevitably take longer.

Payments to parents

When there is no suitable public service or hired vehicle, parents willing to make their own arrangements receive help with the cost of two return journeys per day based on the distance between home and school. Payment is made on a family basis at the current rate of 25p per mile since the cost will be the same whether a parent takes one child or more.

Assistance will not normally be given to parents who prefer to make their own arrangements to transport their child to the **designated*** school where a public service or a hired vehicle is available.

Circumstances when transport is not supplied

Provision other than at the start or end of the school day

Our duty is to provide assistance to get children to and from school at the beginning and end of the school day. It is the responsibility of parents/carers to arrange and pay for transport at other times. For example, we do not provide transport for:

- Breakfast or after school clubs/extra curricular activities
- Medical appointments
- Parents evenings or 'taster' days
- Work experience
- Fixed term exclusions
- Off site educational placements

Independent or private schools (including nurseries)

Assistance is not given to children attending schools in the private sector unless the placement has been made by the Special Educational Needs team and transport has been recommended.

Dual addresses

We only accept responsibility for the transport of children between their **main** residence and school. Where children have more than one address, a determination needs to be made as to which address the child/ren in question habitually reside. This would generally be where most school nights are spent but may include factors such as where the child is registered with a doctor or where the child benefit is paid.

Living within the statutory walking distance

No assistance with travel costs will be given where the distance between home and either the designated school or the school attended is less than three miles (two miles for children under the age of 8 or low income families) unless the route has been classified as unsafe **or** the child/parent has a disability **or** the Transport and Student Support Panel has agreed to make an exception to the normal policy.

Denominational primary schools

There is no policy to support children attending a denominational church aided **primary** school for reasons of religion or faith.

Pupils with special educational needs

Who is eligible?

Children are entitled to assistance with transport in accordance with the policies outlined earlier in this statement. As a result, transport is not automatically given just because a child has a statement of special educational needs.

Some children with special educational needs, especially those attending special schools, will require extra help and we will consider the additional needs of each individual child. This includes; a) the physical ability of the child to walk the prescribed distance and b) the capability of the child to walk (bearing in mind it is assumed that the child will be accompanied by a responsible adult). Transport is **not** provided because of

working commitments.

It should be noted that we are obliged to consider transport to the *nearest suitable school*. If by parental preference a more distant school is named in the child's statement but in the authority's view the child's needs could be suitably met at a nearer school, any transport shall remain the responsibility of the parent.

A separate document detailing the full transport policy for pupils with special educational needs is available.

Spare seats on hired vehicles

Vacant Seats Scheme

Requests are sometimes received from parents who wish their children to use a hired vehicle when they do not qualify travel assistance. If spare places exist, the parent may purchase a travel permit.

Payment must be made in advance and the cost from September 2013 is £120 per term* for a secondary aged pupil and £60 per term* for pupils attending a primary school (*based on the six term year).

A second or subsequent child from the same family is entitled to a 25% reduction in the cost. These charges are subject to a yearly review.

Seat allocations

Where there is more demand for places than seats available, the following priorities will be used to determine who can travel.

1. Pupils attending the **designated*** school but do not qualify for free school transport. Those living furthest from the school are given the highest priority.
2. Other pupils. Those living nearest to the school are given the highest priority.

Places cannot be guaranteed and it must not be assumed that this scheme will always be available. For instance, if a statutory traveller needs a place on a hired vehicle, **non-statutory** travellers will have to be removed. If this is the case, it will be for parents/carers to decide how to get their children to school in the future. Post 16 transport

Commitment

The providers of post 16 education in East Sussex believe in the principle that no student aged 16 to 19 should be deprived of the opportunity to continue their learning because of the lack of transport or the finance to enable them to use transport. The providers have, therefore, developed policies which ensure there is provision for students in greatest financial need by assisting in whole or in part towards the cost of transport. Appeals and complaints procedure

Transport and Student Support Panel

Staff in the Children's Services Department are not empowered to deviate from the stated policy outlined in the section *Qualifying for home to school transport* on page 2. Where applications for assistance with transport are refused, parents may appeal to the Transport and Student Support Panel which can consider particular personal and/or financial circumstances. The Panel comprises three elected County Councillors who consider applications for assistance with transport that fall outside of the stated policy.

The Panel exercises the discretion available to them very carefully, and it is only in the most exceptional circumstances that assistance is agreed. The Panel's decision is final and there is no right of appeal.

Parents will need to fill in an application form and supply any supporting evidence at the same time. Call the Principal Admissions and Transport Officer on 0345 60 80 190 for more details.

How to complain

The County Council is here to serve the people of East Sussex. Services are provided as efficiently as possible and it is expected that staff are helpful, courteous and explain things clearly whether on the telephone, in writing or face to face.

Sometimes things do go wrong and parents/carers may not be happy with the service received. We welcome comments, good and bad, as an opportunity to put things right and improve our services. I live in five ashes and I am the parent of a pupil who will be starting secondary education at Beacon school crowborough this september, most of the leaving children from five ashes primary school now attend beacon with parents having to transport the children each day, there will be an increase in pupils attending beacon over the next few years as there will be siblings moving up from five ashes school.
I believe it would help the children gain their independence and confidence by catching the bus plus free up traffic in the crowborough area and reduce the carbon impact locally.

I have lived in my village for nearly 20 years and part of the decision was on the basis that it was in the catchment area for Claverham school. The schools in Hastings and Bexhill have always been poorly performing which formed my decision that Claverham was the best option for my children. My eldest child (now nearly 20) attended this school with all his peers from our village and my 2 younger children 1 is at the school and 1 is will attend in 2 years time (currently in year 5).

To remove this service from a rural area will have a massive impact on our village and other surrounding villages. Our village and rural areas have no pavements or street lighting. This is not ideal or safe for groups of school children to walking around even in day light let alone after dark. The lanes are narrow in places with many blind bends. Station road - cars speed along as people are late for trains and I myself walk down this and often find it to be far from safe. We have very limited public transport already and the trains are constantly disrupted (I commute to London everyday) and bus replacement services are frequently in use. These DO NOT run to our village and taxi companies take people to our village. This would mean my young girls getting in a taxi cab unsupervised with an adult (mainly male drivers) who are do not believe are CAB checked and driving through dark lanes in the winter months. You would not allow a child to travel in a car with a teacher without necessary checks in place. The distance is judged by crow flies not by road or rail transport which to me seems very out of date and a ridiculous way to judge a childs journey. Both myself and my partner work full time and would not be able to take or collect our children from the school. To allow one of daughters on the bus but not the other makes no sense! How are you saving money if the bus still runs for a time and yet you refuse to let children use it? It seems to me the only way you can is by charging parents for the younger siblings and if this is what you are proposing then why cannot you just be honest and say that? This will put significant pressure on lower income families. Who would want siblings travelling separately you - effectively they will be forced to pay. I pay substantial amount each month in council tax and even more in income tax - and yet my village has no pavement, no street lights, no visible police presence, buses do not run through our village so no public transport - and the trains are extremely limited - outside of rush hour only 1 an hour. We have millions being spent on a by pass to Bexhill - and yet links to London, which improved would provide untold regeneration to the whole area, are totally inadequate. The council is disrupting our whole village and effectively turned it into a construction site and now you wish to further disrupt us with another cut to our services. If you go ahead with this proposal after the terrible train service - no buses and now a bypass going through parts of our village - I will leave the Rother area. I find all the changes you are making are totally illogical. This bus service is vital for children to travel safely to school. I refuse to send my child to the St Leonards Academy when her sister already attends, and is happy at Claverham - or are you expecting me to remove them both, disrupt their education to send them to a school that is frequently underperforming and has very poor pass rates?

I live in Forest Row and less than 3 miles from my nearest secondary school, Sackville in East Grinstead. I am also in the admissions area for Beacon and Chailey. If this proposal goes ahead and funded transport to Beacon or Chailey disappears, we will be left with no way of getting to the schools in the admissions areas, since there are no public busses serving that route.

Until funded transport disappears, I understand that we will be eligible to apply for the Vacant Seat Scheme which is not only expensive at £120 every half term, but it comes with no guarantees that our children will get a seat. So at the last minute we will need to find alternative transport to either Chailey or Beacon - not easy without public transport.

To ensure consistent attendance, we might be best off choosing our nearest school Sackville, which is in West Sussex. There is at least a public bus service going there and at the moment a free bus because the path from Forest Row to Sackville was deemed unsafe. However, if at any point in the future, that path was deemed safe again, we would need to pay £550 per year for one child.

I do not qualify as low income, but the impact on our family finances with two children going to attend secondary school in the next few years of either the public bus to Sackville or the Vacant Bus Scheme to Chailey or Beacon would be huge. Also, I would like to still have the choice of my child going to the schools in our admissions area and feel confident that there would be some kind of transport to get them there.

In rural areas there is often not a viable public transport network, thus meaning that if the school bus to Claverham is not provided the parents will have no choice but to either use private transport or accept the school transport to another school. Families with multiple siblings will find the possible financial implications of these proposals potentially crippling. This could force rural communities into a position where only those that can afford it are able to attend the community school with those who cannot afford the transport costs being sent to other schools. The impact of significant changes to the budgets of rural schools, especially those whose community areas are close to urban areas, could have a huge impact going forward on their ability to function. The reduction in school transport could see a significant increase in traffic on rural roads as parents seek alternative transport. This could have a major environmental impact and force families and young people into situations which pose a significant to their health and safety. This is a particular issue in rural areas where the choice of transport is often the school bus or private transport. The savings made from these proposals may well not be significant as transport providers may charge a similar charge for routes where distances are similar, or only differ by a small margin, but the route to a more urban school poses more significant issues with regard to traffic congestion. Rural schools serve often wide spread communities and are a focus for local people who they have often served for generations. These proposals would seem to undermine these relationships and breakdown traditional values and connections. The schools seeing the main impact from these proposals would seem to be amongst the highest performing schools in the county and those who have sought to remain as Local Authority schools. These proposals would seem to be sending a message that the Local Authority wishes to disassociate itself from these schools and the families in their community areas.
