



QUESTION FROM MEMBERS OF THE PUBLIC

1. Question from Gabriel Carlyle, St Leonards on Sea, East Sussex

Both Hastings Borough Council and Lewes Town Council have now passed cross-party motions calling on East Sussex County Council to divest the East Sussex Pension Fund of its holdings in fossil fuels. What steps are being taken by the Pension Committee to find out from its investment consultants and fund managers whether the Fund's investments can be restructured so as to meet the Fund's fiduciary duties without investing in fossil fuels?

Response by Councillor Stogdon, Chair of the Pension Committee

In accordance with the Local Government Pension Scheme Regulations and associated legislation, the Pension Committee exercises functions and responsibilities for dealing with the East Sussex Pension Fund in conjunction with other bodies. The Committee (rather than the investment consultants and fund managers) make arrangements for the investment, and agree the Investment Strategy/Allocation having regard to the advice of the investment consultants.

2. Question from Karl Horton, Hastings, East Sussex

As a pension fund holder with East Sussex Pension Fund, I welcome the recent addition to the Fund's Investment Strategy Statement stating that "The Fund believes that climate change poses material risks to the Fund but that it also presents positive investment opportunities." In the light of this addition, what tangible steps is the Pension Fund going to take to make sure that their Investment Strategy addresses these risks?

Response by Councillor Stogdon, Chair of the Pension Committee

Following a detailed discussion regarding fossil fuel investments including wider Environmental, Social and Corporate Governance (ESG) responsibilities, and the approval of the Fund Investment Strategy Statement by the Pension Committee at its February 2017 meeting, the Committee and the Board have scheduled 13 June 2017 for a joint training session focusing on ESG responsibilities. This session will be facilitated in conjunction with the investment managers, advisers and industry experts, to explore fully the financial and/or non financial impacts including range of options open to the Fund in relation to ESG investments.

The Pension Committee is committed to an ongoing development of its ESG knowledge with particular emphasis on obtaining further information on the long term financial return in regard to fossil fuel investment, which will further be considered at the fund investment strategy day discussion/meeting in July 2017.

3. Question from Arnold Simanowitz, Lewes, East Sussex

At its 8 September 2016 meeting, the East Sussex Pension Committee resolved "to agree that the Fund should continue to seek to use its influence as a corporate investor to positively influence companies' behaviour. What steps have Fund managers taken,

over the past five years, to "positively influence" the behaviour of the fossil fuel companies, such as Exxon and Chevron, with whom it currently has millions of pounds of local people's pension monies invested, and what have been the result of these steps.

Response by Councillor Stogdon, Chair of the Pension Committee

As long term investors, having a fiduciary duty to 69,000 members and 120 employers within the East Sussex Pension Fund (ESPF), the Pension Committee takes its role of safeguarding the investment assets of the Fund very seriously. As part of its responsibility, the Committee recognises that Environmental, Social and Corporate Governance (ESG) can have a material impact on the long term performance of the investments of the Pension Fund.

East Sussex Pension Fund is a member of the Local Authority Pension Fund Forum (LAPFF) which recognises the issue of stranded assets and continued fossil fuel extraction as a collective investment risk for all asset owners. LAPFF engages by meeting with companies and participating in collaborative investor initiatives including filing and supporting relevant shareholder resolutions to companies. For companies engaged in fossil fuel extraction, LAPFF's approach is to undertake robust engagement on aligning their business models with limiting climate change to a 2°C increase in global temperatures and to push for an orderly low carbon transition. For oil and gas companies, an important engagement focus is the restriction of capital expenditure on high cost resource extraction and promotion of the return of any additional cash generated to shareholders.

Monitoring of progress and outcomes includes LAPFF's participation in the Transition Pathway Initiative, which aids understanding of where companies are placed in the transition to a low carbon economy and their competence to manage this transition.

WRITTEN QUESTIONS PURSUANT TO STANDING ORDER 44

1. <u>Question by Councillor Stephen Shing to the Lead Member for Community</u> <u>Services</u>

Would the Lead Member please confirm whether the County Council has purchased any mobile Speed Indication Devices and/or hand-held laser speed guns over the past 8 years. If so please could the Lead Member provide a summary of the number of devices purchased, the expenditure incurred by the Council and the number of times these devices have been used

Answer by the Lead Member for Community Services

The County Council has purchased one Speed Indicator Device in the past 8 years (March 2015) at a cost of £2,212 ex VAT. The unit is loaned to various road safety groups (formed under the Community Safety Partnerships) who deploy the equipment on an ad-hoc basis.

The SID is used predominantly for training purposes and has been loaned out to Parish/local community groups 6 times since it was purchased. The use of SIDs has declined with the rise in Community Speed Watch and the public wishing to report antisocial driving through Operation Crackdown rather than educate using SID. The unit remains a tool for the community to use should they wish to take this approach and a number of communities/Parish Councils have invested in their own SID following training and site risk assessments.

The County Council has not purchased any hand-held laser speed guns over the past 8 years.

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REPORT OF THE GOVERNANCE COMMITTEE

The Governance Committee met on 12 May 2017. Attendances:

Councillor Glazier (Chair) Councillors Daniel, Elkin and Tutt

1. Appointments to committees, sub-committees, panels and other bodies

1.1 In appointing members to committees, sub-committees, most panels and some outside bodies the Council must comply with section 15 of the Local Government Act 1989 and subsequent Regulations. These provide that places on committees must be allocated to political groups in proportion to the number of seats on the Council held by each group, unless there is agreement, without dissent, that the provisions of the Act should not be applied.

1.2 The allocation of places to party groups must, so far as is reasonably practicable, give effect to the following principles:

(a) not all of the seats on the body can be allocated to the same political group;

(b) where more than half the members of the Council belong to one political group, that group shall have a majority on all committees, sub-committees, etc;

(c) subject to (a) and (b) above, the total number of seats on the ordinary committees (including sub-committees) allocated to a political group reflects that group's proportion of the members of the Council;

(d) subject to (a), (b) and (c) above, the number of seats on each body allocated to a political group reflects the proportion of the seats on the Council held by the group.

1.3 The rules require seats to be allocated on a proportional basis "so far as practicable" and inevitably there must be some rounding up and rounding down. It is open to the Council to review the size and number of committees and sub-committees at any time.

1.4 Members of the Cabinet may not serve on the Scrutiny Committees or the Regulatory Committee and the Leader and Deputy Leader of the Council may not serve on the Standards Committee.

1.5 The Leader of the Council appoints the Cabinet and allocates portfolios to those Cabinet Members. Political balance provisions do not apply to the Cabinet

1.6 The principle in paragraph 1.2 (c) above applies to appointments to ordinary committees (including sub-committees). Accordingly, before considering the allocation of places to political groups the Committee will need to consider whether it wishes to recommend any changes in committees, including their size. The table in Appendix 1 (circulated separately) outlines proposals in relation to committees, their total membership and the number of seats on each to which the groups will be entitled following the principles set out in paragraph 1.2 above.

1.7 The party group leaders and independent members have been asked to let the Assistant Chief Executive have nominations to fill the places on committees, subcommittees, panels and other bodies covered in this report provisionally allocated to their group. The final list of nominations received will be circulated to members of the County Council on the day of the annual council meeting, for approval by the Council.

Other Committees and Panels

1.8 There is no obligation in relation to other committees and panels to aggregate the total number of places and to adjust allocations so that the total number of places allocated to each group reflects its proportion of the members of the Council. It is proposed that places should be allocated on a proportionate basis, unless the Council agrees to waive the political balance provisions which has been the custom for certain panels over many years.

1.9 The practical effect of the proportionality rules for a committee, panel or group of members of any given size from 3 to 12 is set out in Appendix 2, together with the list of current committees and panels to which appointments will need to be made and their membership.

Chairs and Vice Chairs of Committees

1.10 The Council's Constitution provides that the Chairs and Vice Chairs of Scrutiny Committees should be added together and the positions then allocated to groups in accordance to the number of seats they have on the Council. Within this allocation the Chair of the Audit, Best Value and Community Services Scrutiny Committee shall be appointed from the members of the largest Group not represented on the Cabinet. On this basis the allocation of the 10 places would be as follows:

1.11 Responsibility for the Fire Service in East Sussex rests with East Sussex Fire Authority comprising 12 members of the County Council and 6 members of Brighton & Hove City Council. The political balance provisions apply to appointments to the Authority and the entitlement of each group will be as set out below:

Conservative – 7 Liberal Democrat – 3 Labour – 1 Independent Group - 1 Independent Democrat - 0

1.12 The Committee recommends the County Council to:

 \Rightarrow (1) allocate to the political and other groups the places on, and membership of, the main committees as set out in Appendix 1;

(2) allocate places on the other committees and panels as set out in Appendix 2;

(3) allocate the Chair and Vice Chair positions on committees as set out in the table in paragraph 1.10; and

(4) allocate places on the East Sussex Fire Authority to the political and other groups in accordance with the figures in paragraph 1.11 and to appoint 12 councillors to serve on the Authority.

2. Appointments to outside bodies

2.1 The County Council is invited to appoint members (in some cases non-county councillors are eligible) to serve on a wide range of outside bodies. Appointments are normally made for the lifetime of the County Council. In the case of appointments being made now the term will be to the date of the annual council meeting in the next County Council full election year unless otherwise indicated, although in most cases it is open to the County Council to change its representation at any time by resolution.

2.2 Most of the appointments to outside organisations will be dealt with by the Governance Committee at its meeting on the 27 June. There are, however, some bodies where a decision cannot wait until then and these are dealt with in this report. Appendix 1 provides details of these organisations, the current appointments and any particular requirements relating to that particular body.

2.3 With regard to the Police and Crime Panel, the Council has one substantive appointment. The Council may be entitled to a second representative to help address any political proportionality imbalance to the composition of the Panel. At this stage, confirmation has not been received as to whether the Council will have a second representative on the Panel.

2.3 The Committee recommends the County Council make the following appointments to serve on the bodies listed below (a full list of nominations will circulated at the annual Council meeting)

REPORT OF THE LEADER AND LEAD MEMBER FOR STRATEGIC MANAGEMENT AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

The Leader and Lead Member for Strategic Management and Economic Development held a meeting on 7 April 2017. Also present: Councillors Elkin, Field and Keeley.

1. Planning Application Fees

1.1 Planning application fees are set nationally through The Town and Country Planning (Fees for Applications, Deemed Applications, Requests and Site Visits) (England) Regulations 2012. All fees have remained the same following an approximate 15% increase back in 2012. Current planning application fees start at £195, and depending upon the type and size of the proposal can go up to £250,000. The majority of applications the Country Council receives will attract a fee of between £195 and £10,000.

1.2 In February 2017, the Government published the Housing White Paper, entitled 'Fixing our broken housing market'. Part of the White Paper focusses on boosting the capacity and capability of local planning authorities, in order to help facilitate the ability for developers to deliver new homes and businesses, along with the supporting infrastructure and services. Recognising that current planning application fees often do not cover the cost of processing and determining the applications, the White Paper states that the Government "will take steps to secure the financial sustainability of planning departments". In turn, the Paper proposes that "local authorities will be able to increase fees by 20% from July 2017 if they commit to invest the additional fee income in their planning department."

1.3 Following the publication of the Housing White Paper, the Department for Communities and Local Government (DCLG) wrote to all Local Planning Authorities to ask whether or not they would wish to apply the increased planning application fees. DCLG required a reasonable level of assurance on the position of each authority on this matter by early April. This is in order to inform the draft Regulations that will eventually be introduced to bring about the higher fees.

The impact of increased application fees on the County Council

1.4 The amount of income that the County Council's Planning Department receives from planning application fees varies on a year by year basis and depends upon the number and type of planning applications submitted. The income in 2016/17 has been comparatively low (due to a lack of large-scale minerals and waste proposals) at around £75,000. Hence, a 20% increase in fees would result in income of a further £15,000 per annum based on the 2016/17 applications. With some large-scale applications generating an application fee in excess of £25,000, the amount of additional income generated from the higher fees could be considerably higher than £15,000.

1.5 It is recognised that a proportion of this fee income is generated from the County Council's own development proposals. In 2016/17, approximately £30,000 of the fee income has come from applications for County Council development proposals. Based on these figures, a 20% uplift in fees would be an extra burden of £6,000 to those parts of the Council that wish to take forward developments and changes of use. Recognising that budgets for 2017/18 have been set, consideration could be given to maintaining the 2012 fees for County Council applications, even if the higher application fees are agreed. This would be

on the basis that whatever fee is charged for County Council applications, it will not have a net impact upon the Council's overall budget.

1.6 In deciding whether to increase application fees, consideration needs to be given to whether the higher fees may possibly dissuade developers submitting applications and/or seek to regularise development, and, in turn, lead to an increased need for monitoring and enforcement action. In almost all cases the planning application fee only represents a small part of the cost of preparing and submitting an application. The majority of the costs incurred are through the plans prepared and the supporting evidence (e.g. Transport Assessments, Environmental Impact Assessments, Design and Access Statement, site surveys, etc). Hence the impact on developers, in terms of their overall application costs, will be minimal.

1.7 As recognised in the Housing White Paper, much of the lobbying to Government for higher planning application fees has been made by representatives of the development industry. At a local level, representatives at Developers/Agents Forums have generally expressed support for paying higher planning application fees, provided that the higher income received is reinvested back into planning departments. It is therefore considered unlikely that the development industry will see the increase in fees as an extra burden, or dissuade them from submitting planning applications to the County Council (particularly as almost all planning authorities in the south east have already indicated their intention to apply the higher application fees).

1.8 The proposal to increase planning application fees has been put to all members of the Planning Committee. No views/opinions have been expressed that are opposed to the 20% increase. Both the Chair and Vice-Chair of the Planning Committee have expressed their support for the proposal.

1.9 Taking into consideration the rationale behind the proposed increase in fees, the low level of risk that the increase could give rise to, and the support of the Planning Committee for the proposal, the Lead Member agreed to inform the Department for Communities and Local Government that the County Council welcomes the ability to increase planning application fees by 20%.

1.10 The Leader and Lead Cabinet Member for Strategic Management and Economic Development **recommends** the County Council to –

 \Rightarrow (1) agree to adopt the increased planning application fees from the date on which they are brought into effect by the relevant Regulations.
