Appendix 1: Consultation results report

Mental health community outreach

About this consultation

This consultation is about the proposal to stop providing the Mental Health Community Outreach Service and instead use existing community and bed-based services to offer support. It started on 3 October and closed on 28 November 2024.

Taking part in the consultation

The consultation survey was available to complete online and people could download a printable version. Emails, letters and feedback in phone calls were also accepted.

All of the consultations were promoted in our newsletters for residents, providers and staff. We also shared news stories with partners in the statutory and voluntary sectors to include in their newsletters for residents, organisations and staff.

General posters were shared with library teams and each affected service had a dedicated poster to put up in their service or building.

The consultations were widely promoted in the local media and consultation leads talked about the proposals at relevant stakeholder meetings.

Who took part in the consultation

We received 48 responses to this consultation. The table below shows the different ways in which people took part.

There were also 10 responses submitted by email or letter that addressed all of the consultations more generally. A general petition opposing the funding gap proposals was submitted by Lewes Liberal Democrats. It was signed by 100 people.

People were given the option of answering 'about you' equality questions in the survey, with 59% choosing to do so.

- We had responses from people living in all parts of the county, with the top areas being Eastbourne, Hastings and Rother (all 11%).
- Respondents were most likely to be people who live in East Sussex (34%), followed by workers in health and social care, or the VCSE sector (25% and 16% respectively).
- Of those respondents who told us their age, the majority was 60+ (25%) and between 35-54 (22%).

Key messages

These key messages reflect the feedback received from organisations, groups and individuals across surveys, meetings and other feedback such as emails and letters.

- Most respondents disagree with the proposal to close the service, seeing it as a vital lifeline. No one agreed with the proposal.
- Respondents say it is short sighted to cut a preventative service that helps people avoid reaching crisis point, especially at a time when the country is experiencing high levels of poor mental health.
- The service is praised for its accessibility and responsiveness, with people particularly valuing the fact that it offers home visits. They said it prevents people's support needs increasing or becoming more complex.
- People say there aren't alternative services that could offer similar support if it closed. The universal services that people would use instead tend to have much longer waiting times for appointments.
- People say the proposal would be particularly detrimental to the elderly or those with dementia. Without the service, people and their family and carers would become more isolated, not knowing where else to turn for support.
- Health professionals felt that without the service people would become less independent and at increased risk of harm, which will increase demand on other services.
- Closing the service would increase pressure and costs elsewhere in the system, both for the Council and for other organisations who support this group of people, such as hospital dementia services.
- There is concern regarding what other sources of mental health support people will access, especially with high waiting times for other mental health services and proposed closure of the Council's day services for older people.

Sample quotes

These comments are a small selection of the responses we received in the consultation. They reflect the key themes or offer a specific suggestion.

Organisation comments:

- Healthwatch East Sussex: "The proposed changes may restrict people's access to
 essential prevention and support services, which in turn may negatively impact their
 mental and physical wellbeing, place pressure on other services and potentially have
 cost implications in the longer term."
- NHS Sussex: "There could...be wider indirect system impact as this service is valued by the hospital dementia services. Reductions to, or cessation of this service could compound patient flow and delayed discharges."
- Sussex Partnership NHS Foundation Trust: "We welcome East Sussex County Council's support of our strategic objectives to meet the needs of older people with mental health problems and / or dementia, which we believe will support mitigating the impact of the ESCC proposals [to stop this service]."
- Wealden Citizens Advice: "The ability to conduct home visits is essential to these
 clients. The current waiting times for clients to been seen under this existing service
 are really good. If this ceases, then there will be added demand and longer waiting

times from other services. Those with Mental Health issues have crisis periods and need to be seen in a timely fashion and not have long waits for the help that they need."

Individual comments:

- "The country as a whole is going through a mental health crisis currently. There is already very limited help available for those who need it."
- "We're heading for a mental health crisis, and this is just going to add fuel to the fire."
- "Over the years these services have gotten smaller and smaller and less accessible and closing this service is just another closure of vital support for those already vulnerable individuals. This could lead to more reliance with their GP. But these services are limited in what they can provide if no medical need is present. It will increase the isolation of many individuals with mental health."
- "The advice given [by the service] was invaluable and because it was outreach, it
 was something which was easily accessed for very difficult-to-acquire advice."
- "I fear these individuals will be without an appropriate level of support that meets their needs at a time prior to crisis. I worry that there will not be the services out there for these unique individuals. This could and will result in more reliance on more costly services out there longer term."
- "Further reducing mental health services will have a negative impact on those that need it even for [the] short term. Prevention is important."
- "By providing this level of support, we can often reduce or avoid the need for 1-1 care
 and prevent transitions to more costly placements. The closure of this service could,
 therefore, lead to an increased reliance on less cost-effective alternatives, such as
 bedded inpatient units, placing additional pressure on the already bursting healthcare
 system."
- "Elderly people are isolated enough and this has a huge impact on their mental health. Scrapping this service would mean a deterioration of the most vulnerable."
- "At a time when poor mental health is common across ages and backgrounds, cutting
 vital services like this one will only increase anxiety and isolation for those who need
 and rely on the service. Again, the most vulnerable in society are paying the price of
 local and national financial difficulties."
- "Many people are just not capable of accessing services because they cannot leave their homes for various reasons. Statutory services are already stretched when it comes to providing Mental Health services."
- "People with dementia often lose autonomy or are thought to not be able to make their own decisions. This service provides valuable assessment and support for people to make their own decisions and to remain living in the community with the appropriate support. This is a preventative service which must overall save money."

Results summary across all methods

Views on the proposal

Survey: 98% of respondents disagree with the proposal to stop funding the mental health community outreach service, of which 91% chose strongly disagree over disagree. No respondents agreed with the proposal.

The top 10 themes for why people agree or disagree with the proposal are:

- 2) Impact: Poorer mental health (9)
- 3) Views: Adds more cost in the long term for other services and/or East Sussex County Council (8)

- 7) Views: Cuts target vulnerable people (7)
- 8) Views: Equivalent services not available (7)
- 9) Impact: People would have to go into care (6)

Emails etc: The majority of views related to the proposal being particularly detrimental to the elderly (4) and those with a mental illness (2), while the proposal overall targets the most vulnerable (2).


