Appendix 1: Consultation results report

Hookstead and St Nicholas day services

About this consultation

This consultation is about the proposal to close the day service at Hookstead and find people places in alternative services. It started on 3 October and closed on 28 November 2024.

Taking part in the consultation

The consultation survey was available to complete online and people could download printable versions of the standard and easy read surveys too. Emails, letters and feedback in phone calls were also accepted.

All of the consultations were promoted in our newsletters for residents, providers and staff. We also shared news stories with partners in the statutory and voluntary sectors to include in their newsletters for residents, organisations and staff.

General posters were shared with library teams and each affected service had a dedicated poster to put up in their service or building. Consultation meetings with those who use the service and their families and carers also took place.

The consultations were widely promoted in the local media and consultation leads talked about the proposals at relevant stakeholder meetings.

Who took part in the consultation

We received 256 responses to this consultation. The table below shows the different ways in which people took part. We also had 3 late responses received after the consultation closed (2 via letter/email and 1 survey).

There were also 10 responses submitted by email or letter that addressed all of the consultations more generally. A general petition opposing the funding gap proposals for adult social care in the Lewes district was submitted by Lewes Liberal Democrats. It was signed by 100 people. A service-specific petition was also set up by a parent of an adult who accesses this service. The petition runs till February and had over 1,500 signatures when this report was finalised in January. Neither

petition meets the threshold of 5000 signatures which is required for the petition to be considered by Full Council.

People were given the option of answering 'about you' equality questions in the survey, with 69% of respondents choosing to do so.

- We heard from all ages above 18, with a fairly even response from ages 25 and over, the most being over 64 (14%), 25-34, and 45-54 (both 10% respectively).
- A third of respondents (34%) have a physical or mental health condition or illness lasting or expected to last more than 12 months.
- Most respondents are from Wealden (22%), followed by Lewes (8%).

Nearly half of the survey respondents were someone who uses or has used the service, or the family/carer or someone who uses/has used the service (45%), followed by people who live in East Sussex (20%).

Key messages

These key messages reflect the feedback received from organisations, groups and individuals across surveys, meetings and other feedback such as emails and letters.

- The majority of people strongly disagree with the proposal to close Hookstead day service, although a small number recognised the need to make savings and agreed with the proposal.
- Family and carers of those who attend are angry and upset about the proposal and feel it targets a particularly vulnerable group of people.
 They challenged the Council to provide detailed figures setting out how the savings would be achieved.
- Family and carers wanted to know why Hookstead had been proposed for closure instead of St Nicholas.
- The significant impact on vulnerable people would outweigh any benefit achieved through savings.
- The service is seen as vital, providing a safe environment, a high standard of care, and happiness for adults with a learning disability.
- Those who attend Hookstead have established a routine, social connections and stability. This would be destroyed if the proposal went ahead and it would cause significant distress to them.
- Money has been spent on adapting Hookstead to suit the needs of a day service. This investment would be wasted if the proposal went ahead.
- The building and facilities are better at Hookstead and extra money would need to be spent on the facilities in order to accommodate the extra people at St Nicholas.

- Accommodating a larger group of people at St Nicholas would lead to some being unable to cope with the added noise. Those with sensory sensitivities might therefore be unable or unwilling to attend.
- Family members and carers rely on Hookstead for much-needed respite.
 Their family member attending the service helps them to cope with their caring role, maintain employment and their other responsibilities.
- People think it is wrong that there would be no service in the north of the county, and say there are very few alternative options outside of the coastal parts of East Sussex.
- People could be left without a service if the proposal went ahead and St Nicholas didn't work for them.
- Many people are concerned about the practicality of travelling to St Nicholas in Lewes instead. People see the proposal as unrealistic and say that it would place too much of an additional burden on their family.
- If people have to attend a day service that was so much further away, it
 would affect their routines. It could also affect their family's and carer's
 ability to continue with their caring role and maintain their employment.
- Family and carers of those attending Hookstead said the majority of people are unlikely attend St Nicholas as an alternative.
- The few alternative services that are available have long waiting lists and people say that private services would not provide the same level of care as Hookstead.
- From a financial perspective, it is felt that the level of savings that could be achieved would be compromised by the cost of providing alternative support and transporting people further to access support.
- For people whose needs can no longer be met by the proposal, there could be an increase in challenging behaviour which would be more difficult to address, and therefore more costly.
- The main suggestion was not to cut the service. People also suggested
 making the service means tested and charging more for it. They also feel
 that any changes resulting from the proposal must be made very
 carefully, using rigorous assessments to ensure that people's needs are
 still met.
- Families and carers asked the Council to consider allowing another provider to take over the running of the service, so that it could stay open, enabling people to continue to access a service in their local area.

Sample quotes

These comments are a small selection of the responses we received in the consultation. They reflect the key themes or offer a specific suggestion.

Organisation comments:

- Wealden Citizens Advice: "Although in theory it would make sense to merge the service location, the distance is ridiculous to expect those with learning disabilities to be able to manage, especially the commute for the 9.30 session in rush hour from Crowborough to Lewes. Added stress on the families on how to support their cared for to get to the new venue. Good idea in theory but not practical."
- Crowborough Town Council: "The 18+ offering provided by Hookstead forms part of a transitional service supporting families and allowing carers to remain economically active within the community. Change to this offering will undoubtedly lead to families reassess[ing] the viability of working outside the home, or indeed, the ability to care for their young person at home."
- NHS Sussex: "Consideration should be given to what services there would be for people who need a quieter environment due to other diagnoses and sensory sensitivities. Funnelling the clients to other day services could make them even busier and therefore inaccessible to some. Issues which may result in a service user requiring a quieter service, such as sensory sensitivities, can overwhelm and lead to difficulties with social communication and/or interaction, requiring appropriate support and provision. If these needs are not met, it could lead to increasing instances of behaviours that challenge services, and require more resource-intensive, higher-cost, multi-agency input in the medium and longer term."
- Healthwatch East Sussex: "There is some inconsistency between the
 proposals seeking to reduce the cost of home-to-school transport, whilst
 simultaneously transporting adults with learning disabilities from Hookstead
 and Linden Court to alternative day services. Whilst it is important for
 people to have choices about their care and support, this should ideally be
 provided in the communities where they live."

Individual comments:

- "I strongly disagree with the proposal as I do not believe, and no evidence has been provided to show, that other less impactful options have been explored first. For example, reviewing the number of LMGs [local managerial grades] across the council, and whether there is a comparable impact to vulnerable adults. Another example: the transport hub costs a significant amount of money and it would be cheaper to provide our own, if you compare St Nicholas's transport costs to those at Beeching Park or Linden Court. This should only be the last resort rather than the first...How can this be the least worst [option] when it is taking services away from vulnerable people, who by the nature of their disability, are significantly less able to speak up for themselves. The vulnerable...are an easy target."
- "Our son attends St. Nicks [St Nicholas] once a week. Based on the proposed changes, he is likely to be relatively unaffected by them, but being autistic and therefore liking routine, he will react badly to any change. Those who use Hookstead are much more likely to be affected, not least because of

- increased travel distance and time and parking limitations at St. Nicks. While understanding the financial issues at stake, it seems that the most vulnerable people in society are again being asked to suffer."
- "These vulnerable adults have been together for years, some from Southview and now Hookstead, and to break up these friends and groups would have a detrimental effect on them. This will not only affect your clients' mentally but also have repercussions for their aging parents and carers. You state...that there are services by other providers, The Barn in Crowborough, and services in Kent - again, who pays for this as I am sure Kent County Council can't, so where is the saving?"
- "Having worked at St Nicholas I do not feel it is an adequate facility to support a 20% increase in clients, especially if they will all be at the centre rather than some out in the community. It is a very long way from Crowborough to Lewes and it seems not in the interests of helping clients to develop their potential to spend most of their day on a bus, or for their carers to transport them to a centre miles away from where they live. Existing staff at Hookstead may also be lost as they may not be in a position to commute such a distance. The proposed shorter session times would mean that some clients coming from this distance would likely spend more time travelling than at the centre."
- "Neurodivergent people need all the help currently available at local good-quality facilities. And ideally this should be increased (not reduced)."
- "The proposal seems to be focused on fitting as many clients as possible into a space without consideration of their needs and the impact on the quality of the provision. I would have genuine fears that safety and the quality of care could be maintained if this proposal goes ahead."
- "I enjoy coming to Hookstead. It is very important for me to see my friends. It is easy for me to get to."
- "There will be too many people at St. Nicks and I would find it upsetting."
- "By the description of the service alone, stating that people require a quieter environment and structure, [and] the proposed move from a service supporting 42 people to one supporting 100+, it is self-evident that this will cause great distress."
- "Clients who use the service have a number of complex issues. It can take some time for staff to understand exactly what the issues are and how to deal with them. The present relationships will obviously be broken up and this will lead to confusion for both staff and clients."
- "It will change my life. I will be very lonely and sad."
- "It would change my sessions. The times would be different. I don't want twilight sessions."
- "The person will be devastated and traumatized. He 'lives' for Hookstead, all his friends, the going out. Pub night is his favourite (Monday evening). His

- sessions will have to be funded elsewhere but his friends and routine will be gone. Even his usual taxi drivers."
- "My daughter has been attending Hookstead day centre for ten years and has made many friends. Closing the day centre would have a big impact on her. Crowborough is a short journey from Uckfield to get to if there was an emergency (my daughter has epilepsy). Her transport is provided. We as her parents are pension age and don't receive carers allowance."
- "I am very aware that funds are tight everywhere right now and that tough decisions need to be taken. However, this particular decision feels wrong, like discarding the low-hanging fruit. This group of people struggle throughout their daily lives to access services and to have their voices heard. During COVID-19 this group were the first into, and last out of, isolation. They lost access to friends, family, care providers, and in many cases their lives. To now be limiting them further feels very discriminatory."

Results summary across all methods

Views on the proposal

Survey: 75% of respondents disagree with the proposal to close Hookstead day service. The majority chose strongly disagree (66%), over disagree (9%). A small portion of people agreed with the proposal (10%).

The top 10 themes for why people agree or disagree are:

- 1) Views: Commute to services more complex (23 comments)
- 2) Impact: Socialisations (18)
- 3) Impact: Routine change disruptive for people who access support (12)
- 4) Views: Cuts target the most vulnerable (11)
- 5) Impact: Poorer mental health (9)
- 6) Views: Commuting cost to services harder to justify (9)
- 7) Impact: Cause upset to people who access support (8)
- 8) Impact: People's needs won't be met (8)
- 9) Impact: Add more costs in the long-term (7)
- 10) Views: Alternative services not adequate (7)

Emails etc: The most common view was that the commute to alternative services is more complex (6 comments).

Other common views include:

- Views: Disagree (5 comments)
- Views: Recognise need to make savings (5)

- Views: Alternative services not suitable (4)
- Views: Cuts target the most vulnerable (4)
- Views: Don't close service (4)
- Views: Short sighted (4)
- Views: There will be no East Sussex County Council services in the north of the county (4)

Meetings: Attendees were unhappy with the proposal. Some feeling it is disruptive, has not been thought through, and unfairly impacts vulnerable people. It's felt attending St Nicholas is too difficult, as well as there not being adequate space there for people to get appropriate support. In addition, most people said they would not send their loved one to St Nicholas due to the difficulty in accessing it, meaning the proposed savings are based on inaccurate assumptions. Even if people did attend St Nicholas, the transport costs would be significant.

Potential impacts of the proposal

Survey: 98 people answered this question and the top 10 themes are:

- 1) Impact: Routine change disruptive for people who access support (20 comments)
- 2) Impact: Socialisations (19)
- 3) Impact: Cause upset to people who access support (13)
- 4) Comment about personal circumstances (12)
- 5) Impact: Increased burden on family/carer (11)
- 6) Impact: Poorer mental health (10)
- 7) Views: Commute to services more complex (10)
- 8) Impact: Poorer physical health (7)
- 9) Impact: Add more costs in the long-term (6)
- 10) It does not affect me (6)

Emails etc: The top impacts were increased pressure on other service, and that travel and parking would be worse for alternative services (both 6 comments).

Other common themes include:

- Impact: Routine change disruptive for people who access support (5 comments)
- Impact: Ability to maintain work and carer responsibilities (4)
- Impact: Reduced wellbeing of people who access support (4)
- Views: Cause distress to people who access support (4)
- Impact: Increased burden on family/carer (3)
- Impact: Add more costs in the long term (3)

- Impact: People would have to go into care (3)
- Impact: Poorer mental health (3)
- Impact: Risk of East Sussex County Council not meeting statutory duties (3)
- Impact: Savings so small they won't justify impact on people who access support (3)

Meetings: People who attend Hookstead struggle with change. This means the proposal would be disruptive, breaking their stability and routine, and resulting in distress and poor mental health. People accessing the service have also built good friendships that will be severed, creating loneliness and isolation. Travel elsewhere will be challenging, both for people using the service and their families/carers. It also means the families and carers will not be close by in an emergency.

There is already a lack of capacity in other services in the area and demand for day services is only increasing. Taking away Hookstead therefore means people in the area will struggle to get any support and the growth in demand won't be met. Some said they may have to move home in order to easily access a service.

It's also felt that providing the alternative appropriate support, as well as the cost of transporting people to services further away, will be more expensive. Moreover, the impact of the proposal on the wellbeing of people who attend Hookstead could result in an increase in support needs, which again will be more costly and negate any savings made.

For some people, there might not be any appropriate alternative, leaving them with no support at all. This would impact on their families/carers, who do not have capacity to be a carer full-time themselves, or would have to give up work, resulting in financial hardship.

- Other: East Sussex County Council needs to explain why saving proposals were made (3)

Meetings: People felt the decision has already been made, despite consultation, and wanted to know why Hookstead was chosen to close over St Nicholas. The question was raised about what would happen if the merger of services failed, and attendees believed that if the budget changed, Hookstead would likely not reopen.

It was also mentioned that there is very little time to action the changes, and that other services were not happy about being flagged as a potential alternative.



Consultation meetings

Consultation meetings were held at the day services for people who attend them and their parents and carers. Where needed, a virtual meeting was also held. Lots of questions were asked at the meetings and <u>answers to these can be found in the frequently asked questions section</u> of the consultation webpage.

Themes from 7 October from adults who access the service

- Views: People are sad about what is being proposed for Hookstead and think it is a bad idea. They don't think it would work because there wouldn't be enough space, and more lockers and bathrooms would be needed.
- **Service:** Hookstead is a good service. People are keen to know what the proposal would mean for the service at St Nicholas and how it would affect their support. For example, how many people would move to the service,

- would the buses change, how would the sessions be affected, and would they still have the same key worker.
- Impact: People said it would be hard and they don't want to change their days. A few said they would like to have more days at St Nicholas. A couple of people talked about having more people at the service and being able to make new friends.
- Other comments: One person said they want the Shine car service to say open.

Themes from 7 October from parents and carers

 Views: Everyone disagrees with the proposal. They can't see the point of closing the service when there are no alternative options. Hookstead is bearing the brunt of the financial pressures.

The people who attend the service would lose out and it's totally unfair. Those who make the decisions have no lived experience and have no idea what it is like to be affected by a decision like this.

Assumptions have been made that everyone would move to St Nicholas, which is unlikely. The saving is a false figure, as the Council would be spending that money elsewhere for alternative services and to make the necessary improvements to St Nicholas. It would also be a huge waste of the investment already made in the service at Hookstead.

- **Service:** People who attend the service don't want it to close. The value of the service is immeasurable and goes beyond the financial value.
 - St Nicholas is much smaller and doesn't have outdoor space. If St Nicholas closed in future they would be displaced even further.
- Impact: There would be no services in the north of the county. Crowborough is a growing place and demand is likely to grow for these services. There would be no services to meet this future demand.

Other local services are already full and there is no guarantee about being able to access them.

It would be detrimental to those who attend the service, taking away something that provides consistency and stability in their life. Well-established relationships and social networks would be torn apart. Change is often hard for people who use these services. Something as significant as this would create physical and emotional distress. This would all have an impact on the mental health of their families and carers.

The travel would take longer and be much harder, particularly in winter. Some people can't cope with shared transport and need to be taken by family members. This would be particularly hard to coordinate for those in employment, while older carers would also struggle to do the journey. For those who travel by taxi it is already hard to arrange travel to Hookstead, so it would be even more difficult getting to Lewes.

Some people might have to move home as a result and that would cost the Council more. They wouldn't be close by if there was an emergency, and their family member needed them.

- **Suggestion:** Close St Nicholas instead as there are more alternative services nearby.
- Other comments: They feel that the decision has already been made and that carers don't have any choice.

Themes from 9 October from adults who access the service

- Views: People said they are annoyed about the proposal and would be unhappy if Hookstead closed. They like the day service and don't want it to close. They feel they aren't being put first. Someone said they'd been through it before when the day service at Southview Close closed.
 - People are concerned about how they would travel to St Nicholas. Lewes is a lot further away and the journey is more difficult. There was also a lot of discussion about the new session times. Most said they liked them, but a few people weren't keen.
- **Service:** Lots of people said they like it at Hookstead and are happy there. They talked about the activities they like and said they enjoy spending time with friends and their keyworker. The service helps them to be independent and is good for their mental health.
- Impact: There were mixed views about moving to St Nicholas in Lewes, with some saying they definitely didn't want to go there and others saying it could work for them. One person said it would be nice to meet new people.
- Other comments: People wanted to know what would happen if the merger failed.

Themes from 9 October from parents and carers

- Views: People are sad about the proposal and concerned about the impact on those who attend Hookstead. They feel it is unlikely they would travel all the way to Lewes from Crowborough. There was an acknowledgement of the need to make savings.
- **Service:** St Nicholas is a lovely and well-run service.
- Impact: It would take away stability and enjoyment from people who attend Hookstead. They won't want to go elsewhere, and their wellbeing would deteriorate. It is also a long way to travel for people who live in Crowborough.

The reduction in community-based activities and integration would be a great loss that would negatively affect people. It's hard to know what the impact would be until they know their family member's new hours. There is a fear that the service could become too busy and people may struggle in those conditions.

- If people's services are cut it is likely that would have an impact on their family and carers. The long-term result is that it is likely to cost the Council more as people's needs would increase.
- **Suggestions:** Do more community sessions to help with capacity issues in the service. Increase the capacity in both services to spread the workload out more. Make sure that when you do reviews you consider the impact on both the person using the day service and their family and carers.
- Other comments: Once a service is gone it tends to stay closed even if the budget circumstances change. It would be a very tight turnaround from making the decision and making the change in the right way.

Themes from 24 October online meeting

- Views: Action should be encouraged to stop the proposal. People are concerned about whether there would be enough space at St Nicholas for the additional people. It could also make parking difficult as there isn't much space.
- Impact: Transport and parking are the main concerns. The travel would be a nightmare from Crowborough to Lewes. People are also concerned that the change could mean much longer journeys for people already attending, if they are picked up before people from Crowborough.
- Suggestions: Ask the government for more money or ask people to pay more to attend the day service. Consider opening St Nicholas for seven days a week.

Themes from 6 November online meeting

- Views: Many people said there aren't alternative services if Hookstead closed and the options that do exist have long waiting lists. The demand is already there and the independent sector hasn't responded. Its services are also more expensive than the Council-run ones.
 - Those who would be affected are some of the most vulnerable, and that is not fair. Some of them don't have a voice or understand what is being proposed. People also said that reviews of support needs are already many years late.
- **Service:** People praised the staff at Hookstead and their focus on the people who use the service rather than their own jobs. The independent sector doesn't provide a high-quality service like Hookstead. They have nice buildings but use agency staff and are profit making.
 - Some people who use the service can't speak out, but at Hookstead their family know they are looked after and protected.
- Impact: This would have an impact on the community as it would lose a vital service. There are long waiting lists for alternative services, so people could be left without a service. In some cases that would mean that people would have to go into residential care, which would be more expensive.

If people have to change the days they attend the day service, it would throw their lives into chaos and they would need time to make adjustments. For some people it might make it impossible for them to continue in their caring role.

The Council is proposing to close the employment service too, which means more people will need to attend day services as they won't be in employment.

- Suggestions: Invite other providers to take over the service as a going concern. The Council could give them the use of the building rent-free or first year. Use the money from the sale of Southview Close to fund Hookstead. Make more money by offering places at Hookstead to people from outside East Sussex.
- Other: People wanted more clarity about how Hookstead was chosen for potential closure. They said they would take the Council to court if they don't get the services they want. Another service mentioned in the consultation was surprised to be put forward as providing additional day opportunities, saying they had not been approached about this by the Council before the consultation.
